Course Description:

An introductory survey of the visual arts with guidelines to evaluate art by focusing on selected works from the textbook as well as including current local exhibitions and creating individual projects. This course fills the Visual and Performing Arts core curriculum requirements.

Course Objectives:

- Demonstrate an understanding of the creative process, how artists perceive the world and the critical process of thinking about and making art.
- Describe how visual literacy is developed through words and images, and how artists describe the world and think about visual conventions.
- Identify the value of art in a variety of contexts,
- Identify the formal art elements and how they are used in works of art.
- Identify the principles of design relating to works of art.
- Identify the fine arts media: drawing, printmaking processes, painting, photography, time-based media, and sculpture through studies of specific artworks and artifacts.
- Demonstrate an understanding of crafts as fine art, and the media and processes of craft.
- Demonstrate an understanding of the vocabulary of art and art history.
- List and describe movements and styles in the history of art.
- Identify artists and works of art in the historical contexts presented.
- Demonstrate an understanding of the process of critical thinking with regards to appreciating works of art.
- Cultivate a greater appreciation and understanding for the arts.
- Promote discussions of the visual, intellectual, social, and historical facets of art pieces

Course Content:

- Define the term "art" and its purposes, including general categories of visual art
- Identify the visual elements and design principles
- Examine the techniques of the Fine and Applied Arts such as: sculpture, painting, drawing, printmaking, photography and crafts
- The art of the past: historical trends and styles in visual arts and how the art produced by each

COURSE REQUIREMENTS and GRADING CRITERIA:

Possible Methods:

Quizzes, discussions, tests, presentations and written assignments.

Lesson Quizzes

Each quiz will cover the required reading material from our textbook for each lesson. There will be multiple choice, true/false, short answer and essay questions. Each quiz is worth up to 100 points.

Class Discussions

Your participation in class discussion is an important aspect of your grade. The objective of this course is not for you to temporarily memorize terms and definitions for the sole purpose of regurgitating them on an exam. Any terms that you learn are there for you to use in real life situations. They should shed light and help you to look at and talk about art with some degree of authority. Class discussions are designed to help you apply what you learn and to give you a voice in the content of the course. Credit is given for useful contributions to discussions. Participating in the community that we build as a class and making use of that community to practice your skills in analyzing artwork is at the heart and soul of this course. Talk to us, ask us questions, be part of the discussion and benefit from the medium that we have chosen to learn in.

Written Assignments

There will be four written assignments for the course. They will each be worth up to 100 points. The assignment prompt and instructions will be found in the individual lesson folders.

Required Texts: *Gateways to Art: Understanding the Visual Arts*, 3rd Edition. DeWitte, Larman, & Shields.

This is a reading intensive course.

Grading Criteria:

- Attendance: Daily attendance will be taken during class. We will follow SPC and THS attendance policies. The responsibility falls on the students to ensure that work is completed and turned in on time.
- **Participation:** Input in class discussions as well as performance and work ethic in class activities and assignments. (See Class Etiquette)
- Assessments, Discussions and Assignments will be graded and weighted equally for the Dual Credit grade. HS credit grades will follow the THS grading policy.
