Course Description: This course is an intensive study and practice of the composition process from invention and researching to drafting, revising, and editing, both individually and collaboratively. The curriculum includes the teaching of effective rhetorical modes as well as audience, purpose, arrangement, style, and collateral readings. The instructional focus is on writing the academic essay as a vehicle for learning, communicating, and critical analysis.

Prerequisite: Students must be TSI-complete or meet co-req criteria.

- 6. Use American English, with an emphasis on correct grammar, parallelism, punctuation, spelling, and mechanics, in language appropriate for academic essays.
- 7. Write a minimum of six 500-word essays.

Student Code of Conduct Policy: Any successful learning experience requires mutual respect on the part of the student and the instructor. At the beginning of the next class, I will do a homework completion check, then will give you the opportunity to ask whatever questions you want about the assignment. I expect you to have questions, and I will be more than happy to help you to answer those questions.

Essay Grading

Color-coding for graded essays:

Blue – Excellent thesis; strong point and/or support; original thought/well-stated idea Green – Poor grammar; incorrect spelling; wrong word choice; repetitive words and phrases; other mechanics

Pink – Need to start a new paragraph

Need a transition word, phrase, or sentence to link paragraphs.

Need a transition word or phrase between supporting details in paragraph.

Yellow – Unclear or illogical; contradicts previous points in your essay.

You will turn in hardcopies of your prewriting, rough drafts, and final copy in class.

You will also submit ONLY your final copy through Blackboard (electronically).

ALL essays submitted through Blackboard MUST be in a Word document file (.docx file). If you submit through other file formats (.pdf, gdocs, .pages, .rtf, .txt, etc.), your work will not be accepted. You will have one day to resubmit your work correctly. After that, you will receive a ZERO for that essay. You are responsible for making sure work is submitted correctly


