#### **Class Attendance**

Students are expected to attend all classes in order to be successful in a course. The student may be administratively withdrawn from the course when absences become excessive as defined in the course syllabus.

When an unavoidable reason for class absence arises, such as illness, an official trip authorized by the college or an official activity, the instructor may permit the student to make up work missed. It is the student's responsibility to complete work missed within a reasonable period of time as determined by the instructor. Students are officially enrolled in all courses for which they pay tuition and fees at the time of registration. Should a student, for any reason, delay in reporting to a class after official enrollment, absences will be attributed to the student from the first class meeting.

Students who enroll in a course but have "Never Attended" by the official census date, as reported by the faculty member, will be administratively dropped by the Office of Admissions and Records. A student who does not meet the attendance requirements of a class as stated in the course syllabus and does not officially withdraw from that course by the official census date of the semester, may be administratively withdrawn from that course and receive a grade of "X" or "F" as determined by the instructor. Instructors are responsible for clearly stating their administrative drop policy in the course syllabus, and it is the student's responsibility to be aware of that policy.

It is the student's responsibility to verify administrative drops for excessive absences through MySPC using his or her student online account. If it is determined that a student is awarded financial aid for a class or classes in which the student never attended or participated, the financial aid award will be adjusted in accordance with the classes in which the student did attend/participate and the student will owe any balance resulting from the adjustment.

Assignment Policy: Homework will be given daily. Although the homework assignments will be graded sporadically and will not always be graded, *the practice is required in order to more fully understand each topic and to successfully negotiate the quizzes and the tests.* Questions over the homework problems will be discussed at the beginning of each class meeting if time permits.

**On-line quizzes:** There will be unpredicted number of quizzes all online. You will be responsible for beginning and completing the quizzes during their designated times and knowing when the quizzes become available and when they terminate. If you encounter an absence then you are still responsible for the quiz. All online quizzes can be accessed on Blackboard.

The final exam will be comprehensive since the intent of this class is preparation for Business Math II (MATH 1325). The final exam can replace your lowest test grade provided that it is greater than the lowest test grade (the exception is the **H.E.R.**)

- a. Use business formulas to calculate simple interest, compound interest, and evaluate annuities in order to solve finance problems.
