Course Description: This course is a study of the functions performed in the American system of state governments, with special reference to the development of governance in Texas and its Constitutions. This course satisfies the Legislative requirements for teacher certification.

Course Purpose: Government 2306, as taught at South Plains College, is a reading intensive course designed to acquaint the learner with the origin and development of the Texas Constitution, structure and powers of state and local government, federalism and intergovernmental relations, political participation, the election process, public policy, and the political culture of Texas. This course meets the statutory requirements as set forth by the state of Texas.

1. Explain the origin and development of the Texas Constitution.
2. Demonstrate and understanding of state and local political systems and their relationship with the federal government.
3. Describe separation of powers and checks and balances in both theory and practice in Texas.
4. Demonstrate knowledge of the legislative, executive, and judicial branches of Texas Government.
5. Evaluate the role of public opinion, interest groups, and political parties in Texas.
6. Analyze the state and local election process.
7. Describe the rights and responsibilities of citizens.
8. Analyze issues, policies, and political culture of Texas.

 - b. Evaluating choices and actions and relating consequences to personal decision-making
 - c. Accepting personal responsibility for decisions and actions taken or not taken

The object of this course is to give the student a better understanding of Texas government. This course will focus on Texas in the federal system, the Texas Constitution, voting and elections, political parties, the Texas legislature, the Texas governor and the executive branch, the Texas judiciary, law and due process, public policy, and local government.

Course Structure: This online course will include videos, discussion threads, assigned supplemental readings, assignments, and tests. All materials, except for the class required textbook, may be found on Blackboard.

Attendance: Regular attendance is mandatory; attendance will be taken. It is in **your best interest** to attend class regularly and on time. Material that will be covered in class goes well beyond the assigned reading, i.e. many questions that will be on exams come exclusively from lectures rather than the book. If you **DO** miss a class, **you and you alone** are responsible for finding out what you missed from a classmate or from what is posted on Blackboard. I do not repeat lectures in office hours. An absence is defined as failing to attend class, missing 15 or more minutes of class, or leaving class without the instructor's approval. Additionally, a student accrues an absence each time he or she accumulates a total of three late arrivals (i.e. 5+ minutes late). Whenever feasible, students should let the instructor know about expected absences as soon as possible.

Students who have approved absences for athletic or other school approved activities should provide a schedule within the first two weeks. Students who miss classes or exams due to verifiable circumstances such as medical emergencies should provide the documentation to the professor or facilitator as soon as they return to classes.

Student Performance: You must maintain your standards throughout the duration of the semester. There will be no extra credit and there will be little time for playing "catch-up." **If you fail three (3) consecutive "in-class" or reading quizzes, you will be dropped from the class with a failing grade with no further warning (special considerations will be made in the times of COVID-19).** If you fail to submit required work on time, you may be dropped from the class at the discretion of the instructor.

GENERAL POLICIES

- ❖ **BEHAVIOR ONLINE:** Students are expected to be considerate of one another as well as of the instructor. If you need guidance, heed the words of the late Justice Antonin Scalia, “I attack ideas. I don’t attack people. And some very good people have some very bad ideas. - ❖ **GETTING HELP:** Come see me during office hours, or email me, if you have a problem with readings, lecture, or assignments. Please do not wait until the last minute to inform me of issues (emergencies are excluded).
- ❖ **HONESTY:** Honesty is the expected standard. **Plagiarism and cheating will not be tolerated and can be grounds for dismissal from South Plains College.** Incidents of cheating on examinations will result in failure of the course and potential consequences such as dismissal from South Plains College.

Tentative Course Schedule/Pacing

The instructor reserves the right to make changes to this schedule including adding readings and assignments. I will endeavor to give you as much advanced notice as possible for any changes.

Quizzes: The instructor will administer 8-10 reading quizzes. Should a student miss a reading quiz they will be required to submit outlined reading notes for the chapters covered

Discussions: There will be approximately 8-10 discussion thread assignments in this class. These assignments are designed to expand student interaction and relate to current events. Students will be expected to respond to prompts with one initial response of at least 350 words as well as comment on two different student threads (100 words each).

Assignments: There will be a reasonable amount of assignments to supplement student knowledge and understanding. The amount of assignments will be added to this tentative schedule as the semester starts.

Exams: There will be two midterm exams and a final exam. Each exam will be worth 100 points and the final exam will be cumulative.

Make-up Exam Policy: Make-up exams will be allowed with prior notification and may require documentation. Students wishing to take a make-up exam must apply to the instructor via email. **There are no make-ups for the FINAL EXAM.**
